
The 1918 Influenza Epidemic in Montgomery County and the Surrounding Area

October 25, 2018, 7:00 pm - 8:00 pm

Join us for a presentation in our Making History Greater Series when Charles Kelly presents *Black October: The 1918 Influenza Epidemic in Montgomery County and the Surrounding Area.*

The 1918 flu pandemic affected over 500 million people around the world. Wonder why little was spoken about this worldwide plague? Join us for a discussion that will examine the effects of the 1918 Influenza Pandemic on the people of Southeastern Pennsylvania. The 1918 Flu Pandemic killed an estimated 74,000 Pennsylvanians, nearly 13,000 in Philadelphia alone. To prepare his lecture Kelly reviewed local newspaper accounts, numerous web sources, books, as well as publications and Pennsylvania Death Certificates for Montgomery, Philadelphia, Bucks, Berks, Delaware, Chester, and Lehigh Counties.

The Making History Greater series features scholars, authors, and historians who are currently working on telling new stories about the complexity of our region's history. *Black October: The 1918 Influenza Epidemic in Montgomery County* will take place on Thursday, October 25, 2018. The evening will begin at 6:30 pm with a social gathering and light refreshments. The presentation will begin at 7:00 pm and last for about an hour with time for questions at the end. This program is free and open to the public.

Symbols in the Cemetery Walking Tour of Historic Montgomery Cemetery

August 18, 2018, 6:30 pm - 8:00 pm



The Historical Society of Montgomery County announces a special combination event on Saturday, August 18, 2018, that looks at the symbolic meanings of tombstones. The event will feature a walking tour of Historic Montgomery Cemetery that begins at 6:30 p.m. with stops that highlights some of the symbolic representations found on the cemetery's gravestones. This walking tour will be followed by light refreshments inside the Cemetery's gatehouse with a presentation from 7:15 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The presentation will be provided by historian Tammy Schane who will discuss many of the symbols found on tombstones throughout the region.

The early 19th century saw the birth of the rural garden cemetery, which began in Paris and spread to the United States by 1824. Tombstone memorials also experienced great change throughout the 19th century, as Americans thought about death in new, more emotional and evocative ways. Tombstone carvers were tasked with carving symbols that illustrated a softer, aesthetically pleasing, and more hopeful way of viewing death as not an endpoint, but rather a step on the path to a better and glorious afterlife where family would be reunited. Tammy Schane has photographed and studied 19th century tombstone carvings in Pennsylvania and surrounding states and will present the meanings behind them. These symbols were a language of sorts in their time and still speak to us today.

Tammy E. Schane holds a B.S. from Syracuse University in Journalism and History, and is currently pursuing a M.A. in Public History from LaSalle Universi-

ty. She has worked for Heritage Conservancy in Doylestown, Pennsylvania, as the membership coordinator and lead docent of tours of historic Aldie Mansion. She currently volunteers as a tour guide at Doylestown Cemetery and has researched and written a tour about the site's 19th-century tombstone symbols and their meanings. She lectures on her research of 18th- and 19th-century cemeteries to historical societies and other groups, and in 2016, she published a book called, "Engraved: The Meanings Behind 19th-Century Tombstone Symbols."

Aha!!! From Our Blogs by Nancy Sullivan, Archivist

If you've ever come into our library to do some family research or look up some local history you've probably used one of the several historical and biographical works by authors such as Milton Bean, Charles Hunsicker, and Moses Auge. This week's blog is about Moses Auge, author of *Lives of Eminent Dead and Biographical Notices of Prominent Living Citizens of Montgomery County, Pa.* As I've noted before, people in the past were not concerned with catchy book titles.

Auge was born in Delaware in 1811 and spent his youth in Chester County. He moved to Norristown after he married. He was a hatter by trade. The 1860 Norristown city directory lists him as:

Auge, Moses, hats clothing and Editor, 178 Egypt Street


"Egypt Street" is now Main Street. He edited two newspapers in Norristown, the *Republican* and the *True Witness*. Both papers were pro-temperance and anti-slavery.

During his time editing the *Republican*, 1857-1862, Auge and his co-editor John H. Williams were both sued for libel by Henry L. Acker. We don't have a copy of the original paper, but luckily for us, the indictment reproduced the article, along with interjections of legalese:




The masthead of the Republican after Ague's time as editor.


Aha!!! Our old friend Acker (meaning the said Henry L. Acker) brother of the editor of the Norristown Register, late editor of the Pottsville Democratic Standard, and post-master at that place under Buchanan, was one day this week honored with a visit from the U. S. Marshall which functionary favored him with a free ride to Philadelphia to answer a charge of embezzling six thousand dollars (meaning six thousand dollars of the public monies of the United States of America received by him the said Henry



L. Acker as such postmaster) it perhaps be remembered by our readers, was some time ago, much troubled about some people long ears! We told him at the time, that, although not a very graceful appendage, they were not so apt to let their owners into trouble as were long fingers (meaning thereby that the said Henry L. Acker has then and there unlawfully appropriated money to himself which did not justly belong to him), and now, we suppose, he will believe we were about right. Virtuous Acker (meaning said Henry L. Acker) while he presided over the columns of the Standard who so horrified and indignant as he over the frauds and thefts of the government contractors and Republican office holders. Now how have the might fallen. Sic transit gloria mundi.

A surprising \$500 bond was entered for each man and one Jacob Cowden, who is not mentioned in the indictment. Acker himself was ordered to pay a bond of \$100 upon condition he appear. We also have the total costs of the trial, which called thirteen witnesses, who each cost the Commonwealth \$1.50 (the paper doesn't say if this was to feed them or transport them or what). Acker himself cost the county \$7.17.





The only thing we don't know – the verdict. It's not among the court papers, nor does the case seem to have been covered in the *Times-Herald* (although, its publisher, Robert Iredell was called as a witness). Auge's time at the Republican ended the same year, however. He published his well-used book of local biographies in 1878 and died in 1892.

Nothing is certain except death and taxes. Culturally, however, the American way of death is anything but certain. Over time, popular funeral and burial rituals have changed dramatically as we have shifted our attitudes towards death.

This special tour of Historic Montgomery Cemetery on September 22, 2018, from 5:00 pm to 6:30 pm, includes a walking tour of the cemetery followed by refreshments and a presentation in the Gatehouse that will examine how America's attitudes towards death have changed since early European settlement. The Historical Society's Executive Director, Barry Rauhauser, will illustrate how global patterns in culture affect the way we view aging and death and look at how some of America's historical events helped to create a unique American view on death and dying

With almost 6,000 known burials, Historic Montgomery Cemetery holds the remains of some of the most prominent citizens, veterans, and reformers in the county and nation. A History and Local Impact of the Schuylkill Canals

Making History Greater Series August 30, 2018, 7:00 pm - 8:00 pm

Join us on August 30, 2018 when Marianne Hooper Furman presents A History and Local Impact of the Schuylkill Canals!

Built and opened in the 1820s, the Schuylkill Canal was a network of constructed waterways, pools, and locks along the Schuylkill River that significantly improved efficiency in transporting shipments (especially anthracite coal) between Pottsville and Philadelphia. It also served as a source of water power, and led to a manufacturing boom in many river towns. The canal's impact was felt throughout Southeastern Pennsylvania, including the King Of Prussia area. It survived in various forms for more than century, before shutting down during the Great Depression. While little evidence of this famous piece of American infrastructure exists today, some of the few remnants still visible happen to be near our area.
